

What is a Narcotic?

A narcotic, also known as an opioid, is commonly used for pain.


Commonly used Opioids:

Generic	Brand Name
Hydrocodone	Vicodin, Lorcet, Lortab, Norco
Oxycodone	Oxycontin, Percocet
Morphine	Kadian, MSContin
Codeine	Tylenol #3
Fentanyl	Duragesic
Hydromorphone	Dilaudid
Oxymorphone	Opana
Meperidine	Demerol
Methadone	Dolophine, Methadose
Buprenorphine	Suboxone, Subutex

^{*}Heroin is an illegal opioid

Statistics

Every 12 minutes someone dies from opioid use nationally





What is an overdose?

An overdose is when you take too much of a drug that can put your life at risk.

Signs and Symptoms

- Unresponsive
- Breathing is slowed or stopped
- Pale, clammy skin
- Slow or no heartbeat
- Blue lips and/or fingertips

Risk Factors

- Previous overdose
- Change in type of opioid
- Mixing drugs
- Medical conditions
- Reduced tolerance

What is Naloxone?

Naloxone is a rescue drug that reverses that effects of an opioid overdose

This drug only works on opioid overdoses. It has no effect on any other medications or alcohol.

Accidental administration cannot hurt you.

How does it work?

- Naloxone blocks the effects of opioids
- Starts working within 30-45 seconds and continues to work for 30-45 minutes

Rescue Steps

- Check for response through physical stimulation
- Give naloxone
- Place patient into recovery position
- 4. Call 911
- Give rescue breaths
- 6. Assess and respond after first dose of naloxone
