Patients will be asked for approximately 10 minutes of their time (one time only) and won't be receiving any compensation for participating. #### Note from the Chair

I had the opportunity to present Grand Rounds last week to Carilion Clinic's Department of Pediatrics. The focus was on the combined effects of structural racism, COVID-19, childhood trauma and mental illness. As I prepared the talk, it really got me thinking about the multiple elements involved. Each of these – racism, trauma, COVID-19 - individually have a profound impact on the mental health of children. The combination we are now dealing with is indeed a toxic brew and will certainly have lasting impact. We work to make a difference in each of our clinical settings, whether targeting the children directly, the entire family, or the parents themselves. As we move forward, we will need to build on our community relationships to help change the culture and infrastructure of our communities if we really want to make a difference. Outreach, education, and collaboration have long been a part of Psychiatry. I believe that in the months ahead, it will need to be a growing part. Working in collaboration with the schools, the community service boards, public services, not-for-profit agencies, and housing opportunities, I believe that we will be able to reshape our communities to enable everyone to live a healthier life. I am genuinely optimistic. I really look forward to all of us working together to help make that happen.

#### Note from the Chair

Over the years, we have developed significant awareness of the morbidity and mortality associated with posttraumatic stress disorder (PTSD). Another

stressor-related phenomenon, posttraumatic growth, has received much less attention. It is typically defined as "positive psychological change experienced as a result of a struggle with highly challenging life circumstances." The work on posttraumatic growth goes back at least to the 1990's and suggests a pathway after serious trauma that leads to enhanced resilience, adaptive coping, flexibility, and action-oriented optimism. In last week's JAMA, a two-page article (attached as JAMA Olson 2020 and available on line

at <a href="https://jamanetwork.com/journals/jama/fullarticle/2771807">https://jamanetwork.com/journals/jama/fullarticle/2771807</a>) speaks to the implications and opportunities for posttraumatic growth as we cope with a tide of natural disasters, civic unrest, and a lethal pandemic. The article (written by folks from Stanford, Yale, and Mt. Sinai). Such growth is not passive; it clearly requires reflection and learning. The process discussed includes active management to develop deeper relationships, become open to new possibilities, recognize and nurture a sense of strength and spirituality, and a greater appreciation of the limits and opportunities that life affords us. I encourage you to read it- and reflect upon what we might each do to emerge from these extraordinary times more resilient, more caring, and more aware of what really matters.

# From Inside Carilion- "Veterans Day: Answering the Call to Serve"

• Byron Lawson, Intermediate Care and Psychiatric Technician, Inpatient Psychiatry, also served on the USNS Comfort in its mission (Operation Gotham) to New York City, where he worked in outpatient mental health rounding on all units and departments on all shifts to assess the crew's well-being. He was a resource for anything they may need. Sailors had a 48-hour notice to report to the ship for duty, so there was little time to mentally prepare. "I worked in an outpatient mental health capacity to solve and de-escalate crew members on the floor, so we could help to decrease the need for them to require outpatient mental health services," says Byron. "This was essentially like having Carilion EAP come directly to frontline workers--offering them on-the-spot services."

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#### Note from the Chair

The World Health Organization has recently reported that, under the strain of the pandemic, mental health and substance abuse services are disrupted and collapsing in 93% of the world's countries. In the US, our case rates and the rate of hospitalizations is quite literally skyrocketing. Locally, we are seeing an increase in cases and the consequences of the pandemic, both direct and indirect. Our emergency, inpatient, and ambulatory psychiatric services are dealing with

extraordinarily high need. And yet, I still see people in the community without masks and not socially distancing. I hear of people who plan to gather in their traditional groups for Thanksgiving celebrations. In psychiatry, we typically see severely ill individuals disconnected from reality. We are now seeing a large number of people without a diagnosable mental illness behaving as though they are delusional, denying the reality of this life-threatening disease. As we enter the holiday season, I implore each of you to work to educate those around you in the community to wear masks and socially distance. At best, vaccines are months away. COVID-19 is only a breath away. Be well- and please stay safe.

#### Note from the Chair
